Some benefits in the classroom

- Encourages speaking and listening fluency
- Student interaction
- Confidence building
- Increased motivation
- Compensation strategies (circumlocution)
- Natural exposure to language in context

Looking at a picture from the story, predict what will happen.

Given the first and last sentence, predict...

- One day, Joha was riding his donkey to market.
- It's impossible to please everyone all the time, so it was best if each person decides how to live his or her own life.

Pause and Predict - 1

One day, Joha was riding his donkey to market. Joha's son walked beside the donkey, holding the reins and talking with his father.

When they passed a group of villagers, the people criticized Joha. They asked, "How can you be so heartless, Joha? How can you ride upon the donkey while your son is forced to walk beside you?"

What happened next?

Pause and Predict - 2

When Joha heard this, he climbed down and lifted his son up onto the donkey's back.

They continued on their journey, Joha walking beside the donkey, holding the reins as they made their way towards the market.

What happened next?

Chose the most important words


Encourage interaction by having students make sound effects

- Donkey walking
- Villagers scoffing
- Neighbors laughing

Sound Effects & Questions

Walking down the road, Joha, his son, and the donkey passed a group of women gathered around a well.

When the women saw Joha they were shocked. They asked him, 'How is it that an old man walks while his young son rides the donkey? Surely this is not right!'

Enhancing understanding

- Tell and retell story using pictures, prompts, real objects, etc
- Give a purpose for listening to the story and a task to do while listening
- Revise existing vocabulary
- Pre-teach new vocabulary
- Relate story themes to learners' lives
- Elicit students' reactions and opinions

Enhancing understanding

- Prediction before, during, and after the story
- Encourage students to act out and discuss stories
- Get students to join in the repeated phrases in the story
- How could this be extended?

Extension Activities

- Letter to Joha
- Story reviews
- Summary/Retelling
- Write a poem/song about story
- Change the climax





Let's Create a Story!


Madlibs
