

ALASKA -THE LAND OF ICE-















Alaska

In Aleut language, which is spoken on volcanic Aleutin islands-politically divided between the Alaska and Russian Kamchatka Krai, Alaska means "The Great Land". Alaska has a nickname "The Last frontier".

Although its territory isn't physically connected to other states, Alaska was admitted as the 49th state of the U.S. in 1959 and actually it's the largest American State. Its capital is Juneau while some other cities are Fairbanks, Anchorage, Valdez, Talkeetna, etc.

Russia sold Alaska to the U.S. for \$7.2 million in 1867 believing the U.S. would off-set the designs of Russia's greatest rival in the Pacific, Great Britain.

The 1968 discovery of oil and gas, and later gold and precious stones (1898) led to an economic boom and today's population is 736,556-population density is one person per square mile.



ALASKAN FLAG

The blue field represents the sky, the sea, mountain lakes and the-forget-menot flower. There are eight gold starsseven from the "Big Dipper" which is the part of the constellation "Great Bear" (symbol of strength) while the eighth one- the North Star, represents the northernmost American state and its prosperous future – its motto is "North to the future".

The flag was designed by a 13-year-old Benny Benson.









Interesting facts about Alaska

- > Alaska has more than 3 million lakes and 130 volcanoes (90 of them are active).
- > The Interior is the largest region of Alaska; much of it is uninhabited wilderness.
- > The climate of the interior of Alaska is subarctic.
- > In winter, the temperature can fall below -51°C while the snow and ice stay on the ground almost the entire year. The lowest temperature recorded in Alaska was -62°C (Prospect Creek Camp in 1971).
- > The state sport of Alaska is dog mushing (derived from the word "march"- this was in the past the only transportation method in Alaska-). The Sled Dog Race is the state's largest sporting event (March).
- > Almost 1/3 of Alaska's land is in the Arctic Circle.
- > The northern light can be seen in Alaska. The Aurora Borealis (northern light/polar light or "the midnight sun" sunset- that lasts forever) can be seen on average of 243 days a year in the city of Fairbanks.
- > The city of Anchorage is home to a unique place called Gravity Hill, where the laws of physics don't apply. A car in neutral at the bottom of the hill mysteriously rolls up instead of down!
- > Alaska is the only state that neither has nor collects state sales tax.
- > Seafood is a big business- the most famous exported fish is salmon-








"Ice Alaska" is the annual Ice Art and Competition event (February-March)






